Supplies		
Sewing machine size 75 & 90 quilting needles (suggested) '4" foot for piecing Walking foot or even feed for quilting Rotary Cutter with fresh blade Rulers: Long such as 6" X 24" and small such as 4" X 14" Scissors Pins and/or clips Neutral colored 50 wt. cotton thread for piecing 30 or 40 wt. rayon, polyester or cotton thread for quilting		
Optional Supplies (see notes before purchasing)		
Blue painter's masking tape Starch, sizing or Best Press spray 15 ½" square ruler or acrylic template Superior MonoPoly clear thread (invisible thread, see notes) 6 ½" Bloc Loc Ruler Clearly Perfect Slotted Trimmers Quilt in a Day Sew Straight Guide Lazy Girl Designs Flying Geese Ruler		



Notes

- Please only use the Hobb's Heirloom Fusible batting.
 <u>Do not use polyester batting</u> you will not be happy with your finished quilt. If you cannot get the Hobb's fusible, you may use low-loft cotton batting and temporary adhesive spray such as Sulky KK2000 or 505 spray.
- If your fabric is dark, you may want to use the smoke colored MonoPoly thread instead of the clear to sew down your sashing. (Invisible thread is optional; we will discuss other options in the final class.)
- If you have any of the rulers listed in the Optional Supplies, pull them out and we will learn how to use them. If you don't have them, I recommend watching the demo before purchasing. Different techniques work for different quilters, so don't spend money on a tool that's not right for you.
- I mix liquid starch 1:1 with water to stiffen the fabrics for my blocks.


Fabric Selection for Blocks

- If you want to make your quilt scrappy, use different fabrics from your stash each week for your blocks.
- This probably seems like a lot of fabric for one quilt, but remember this is everything you need to complete your quilt. Most patterns do not include batting, backing and binding. I was also generous with the block fabric so that you can make choices as you go to customize your quilt blocks.
- The fabric on the back of your quilt can be completely different than the front. I often use assorted black and whites for the backs of my quilts.


