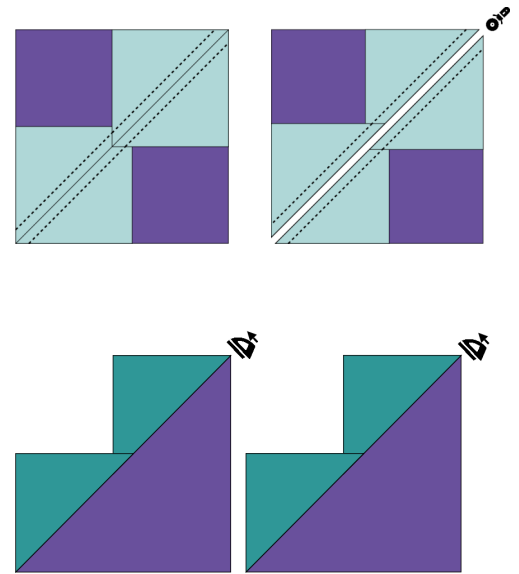


FLYING GEESE 4 AT-A-TIME CHEAT SHEET

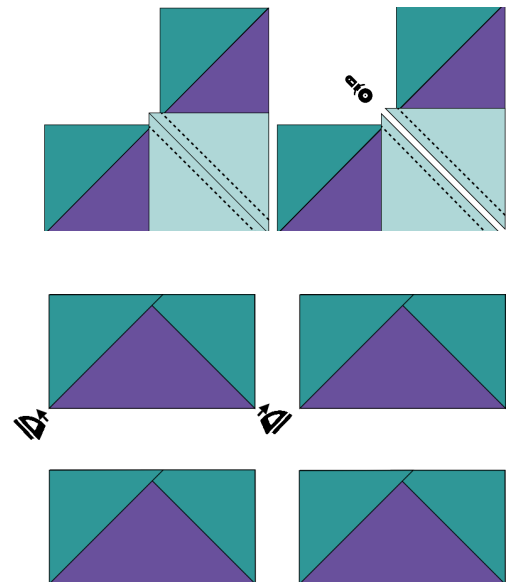
This method makes 4 identical flying geese units without wasting any fabric.

Geese Unfinished Size	Geese Finished Size	Cut 1 Large Square	Cut 4 Small Squares
1 ½ x 2 ½	1 x 2	3 ¼	1 ⅛
2 x 3 ½	1 ½ x 3	4 ¼	2 ⅜
2 ½ x 4 ½	2 x 4	5 ¼	2 ⅞
3 x 5 ½	2 ½ x 5	6 ¼	3 ⅜
3 ½ x 6 ½	3 x 6	7 ¼	3 ⅞
4 x 7 ½	3 ½ x 7	8 ¼	4 ⅞
4 ½ x 8 ½	4 x 8	9 ¼	4 ⅞
5 x 9 ½	4 ½ x 9	10 ¼	5 ⅞
5 ½ x 10 ½	5 x 10	11 ¼	5 ⅞
6 x 11 ½	5 ½ x 11	12 ¼	6 ⅞
6 ½ x 12 ½	6 x 12	13 ¼	6 ⅞



All measurements are in inches

- Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of each small square.
- Place (2) small squares on opposite corners of the large square, right sides together.
- Stitch 1/4" on each side of the drawn diagonal line.
- Cut apart along the drawn line and press toward the triangles.
- Place a small square on each corner of the large square as shown in the diagram.
- Stitch 1/4" from each side of the diagonal line.
- Cut apart along the drawn line and press toward the small triangles.





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
